Airlines in 1928.

• Bert Convy, a TV game-show host. Convy also was a baseball player for the Salina Blue Jays, a Class A minor league team.

• Thomas Craven, an art critic who wrote for American Mercury and the New York Times in the first half of the 20th century.

• Bill Graves, president and CEO of American Trucking Associations, is a former two-term Kansas governor and also served two terms as Kansas Secretary of State.

• Paul Harvey, the late news commentator, is a former Salina radio station manager.
